

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



GRANTS BY AREA OF FOCUS







OVERVIEW OF GRANTS FOR 2019: TOTAL GIVEN: \$953,362




Yearly Grant Amount by State *sorted by largest to smallest amount in 2019

BLIND AND VISUALLY IMPAIRED

TGFF strives to empower visually impaired individuals with independence, employment and quality of life which all should be able to enjoy.

CARROLL CENTER FOR THE BLIND \$40,000

An initiative to launch a professional internship program for university scholars in the field of blindness.

COLORADO CENTER FOR THE BLIND \$10,000

Support an existing program that will allow CCB to expand their training seminars, reach more blind individuals and create new job opportunities and placements.

FLORIDA ASSOCIATION OF AGENCIES \$10,500 SERVING THE BLIND

Support includes a Statewide Vision Summit to address the needs of the aging population and work on the creation of a new profession: Support Services Provider/Older Individuals who are Blind (SSP/OIB).

FOUNDATION FOR BLIND CHILDREN \$5,000

Support The "Ready To Work" program, which is a multifaceted program designed to prepare youth who are blind to be self sufficient, contributing members in their community when they reach adulthood.





FUTURE IN SIGHT

\$25,000

Assist FIS with a capacity building initiative designed to reach, educate, and serve more infants and toddlers (birth up to the third birthday) in NH who have visual impairments, including their parents and vision resource coordinators.

IDAHO EDUCATIONAL SERVICES FOR \$5,000 THE DEAF AND THE BLIND FOUNDATION

Provide blind and visually impaired students the opportunity to attend an overnight educational and activity camp to learn life skills, participate in activities, and increase self confidence.

MAB COMMUITY SERVICES, INC. \$31,000

Support the expansion of their existing volunteer program to become a statewide program, reaching a broader population of seniors who need assistance.

MANA-SOTA LIGHTHOUSE FOR THE \$35,000 BLIND, INC.

Funding to create two levels of training for their existing Adjustment to Vision Loss course, which will enable more clients to participate.

NATIONAL BRAILLE PRESS

\$18,350

Fund the Touch of Genius Award which supports the development of affordable braille and tactile literacy technology solutions for the blind and visually impaired.

NATIONAL FEDERATION OF THE \$5,000 BLIND, IDAHO

Assist in establishing a week long residential camp experience where students will learn skills for independence, braille literacy and increase confidence.

NEW ENGLAND REGIONAL \$4,996 SKI FOR LIGHT

Assist in funding the replacement of their handheld radios, which are important safety equipment, as well as creating a new website.

NEVADA BLIND CHILDREN'S \$35,000 FOUNDATION

Funds will allow them to kick off their fundraising efforts for a capital campaign to purchase their facilities by covering the marketing and hard costs associated with the campaign.

Support increasing the awareness and solutions to improve accessibility in the workplace, marketplace and educational system with the goal of expanding access and employment opportunities for youth and adults.







PERKINS SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND \$22,637

Provide tools and education materials to propel teens who are blind or visually impaired to successful college, employment, and community living.

SOUTHERN ARIZONA ASSOCIATION \$25,000 FOR THE VISUALLY IMPAIRED

Support SAAVI as they become the first Structured Discovery Rehabilitation Center in Arizona. This will teach independence to individuals who are blind and visually impaired.

VISIONSERVE ALLIANCE

\$30,000

Enable VSA to conduct its 2019 Fall Executive Leadership Conference as an Open Space Technology event and seek to engage leaders across all sectors involved in the field of blindness, low vision and vision loss.

VERMONT FAMILY NETWORK, INC \$4,200

Provide two Vermont schools with full-day puppet presentations and workshops about blindness where a student who is blind/visually impaired attends.

DISABLED SPORTS & ADAPTIVE TECHNOLOGY

TGFF helps organizations put smiles on faces and confidence in souls to reach for the stars through sports and recreation and furthering independence through adaptive technology solutions.

ACHILLES INTERNATIONAL, INC \$12,464 CONNECTICUT CHAPTER

Provide partial funding to support their Director of Development who helps increase revenue through grants, sponsorship and donations. This position strengthens the Chapter's infrastructure.

HIGHER GROUND SUN VALLEY, INC. \$51,945

Enable Higher Ground to provide individualized, targeted recreation and sports instruction to students from Idaho School for the Deaf and Blind in a fully accessible, inclusive environment, so they can build fundamental skills.

NORTHEAST PASSAGE

\$24,381

Enable them to create a new partnership with Project Walk Boston in Stratham, NH to help individuals with Spinal Cord Injury (SCI) enjoy improved emotional and physical well-being.

OAK HILL, CHAPTER 126

\$34,894

Support an Adaptive Sports Field Trip program which will provide an opportunity for children with and without disabilities from schools across Connecticut to play adaptive sports together and learn about blindness.





SMART LIVING, LEARNING & EARNING WITH AUTISM

\$45,000

Provide the resources to significantly advance their ability to embed task analysis and systematic instruction for all their students through technology.

UNITED STATES ASSOCIATION OF \$30,000 BLIND ATHLETES \$30,000

Provide seed money to establish the Wellness Activity Challenge program. The program will incentivize individuals who are blind and visually impaired access to participate in adaptive sports and recreational activities and assist them in developing a physical fitness regimen.

UTAH ASSISTIVE TECHNOLOGY \$20,000 PROGRAM

Provide funding to UATP to purchase a cargo van to deliver refurbished mobility equipment and pick up donated equipment. Increased public awareness will be widely seen with new marketing information on the van's exterior.

WAYPOINT ADVENTURES, INC.

\$6,800

Enable Waypoint to purchase an electric mountain bike for use by disabled adventurers eager to participate in hikes and outdoor adventures.

YOUTH & FAMILY SUPPORT

Hard work, focused education, and a "it takes a village approach" helps at-risk youth to see their potential. Strong families are a pillar of our society and we are committed to helping these families survive and thrive.

CHILDREN'S HOME SOCIETY \$50,000 OF IDAHO

Enable CHS to meet the critical need of attracting and retaining additional clinicians/therapists in order to serve more children in need.

EYE TO EYE, INC.

\$20,000

They are serving 200+ middle school students with learning disabilities through projects that intentionally build social and emotional skills.

HOPE COMMUNITY SERVICES \$20,000

Enable them to further expand and enhance their behavioral health program by increasing the number of therapists.

IDAHO YOUTH RANCH, INC.

\$40,000

Enable them to accelerate their services of equine-assisted psychotherapy to youth.

GIFTS OF LOVE

\$10,000

Funding to support and increase their Weekend Backpack Program, which fills a gap in providing food assistance to children and families.

SMART READING

\$30,000

Enable them to serve more children in SMART by increasing the number technological resources the Site Coordinators use, as well as providing additional flexible training options. ** Next Generation Board Impact Grant

\$10,000

Provide funds to enhance operational support equipment to keep up with the growing demands.

HEALING MEALS COMMUNITY \$40,000 PROJECT

Support the development and implementation of an operational plan which includes policies and procedures that will promote ongoing business efficiency.

HOOFBEATS TO HEALING STRAIGHTER WAY FOUNDATION

\$5,000

Purchase more effective saddles for optimal therapeutic riding experience for clients.

INCLUDEABILITY, INC.

\$10,000

Provide funding towards the production of "Making Sense", the first full length independent feature film to feature five forms of disability played by actors with disabilities.

NORTHEAST DEAF AND HARD OF \$25,000 HEARING

Funding a teacher of the deaf to work with toddlers and their families enabling them to get a head start on accessibility and services before preschool.

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Thanks to funding received from TGFF for a new COO position, we now have a strong operational organization. This new structure enables us to demonstrate to other funders that we are a viable and sustainable organization.

It is our intention to actively pursue additional speaking engagements, deepen current relationships and apply for grants from a larger audience in 2020.

Without the continued generosity of our community partners, we would not have been able to get to 30,000 total meals served to date to over 250 families in 45 towns in Connecticut.
