TGFF helps organizations put smiles on faces and build confidence through adaptive recreation, leadership and specialized programs to further independence.

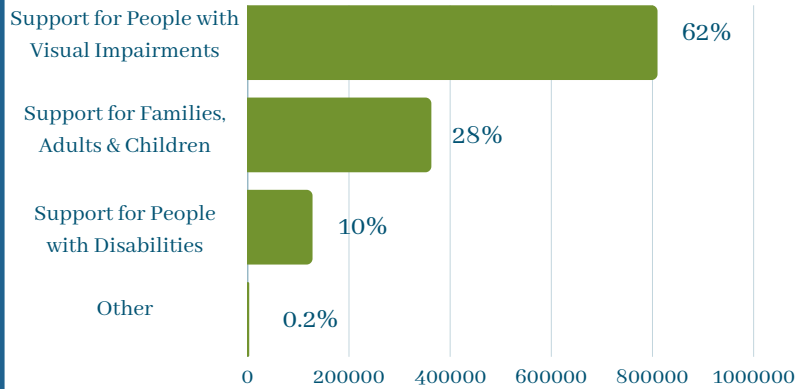

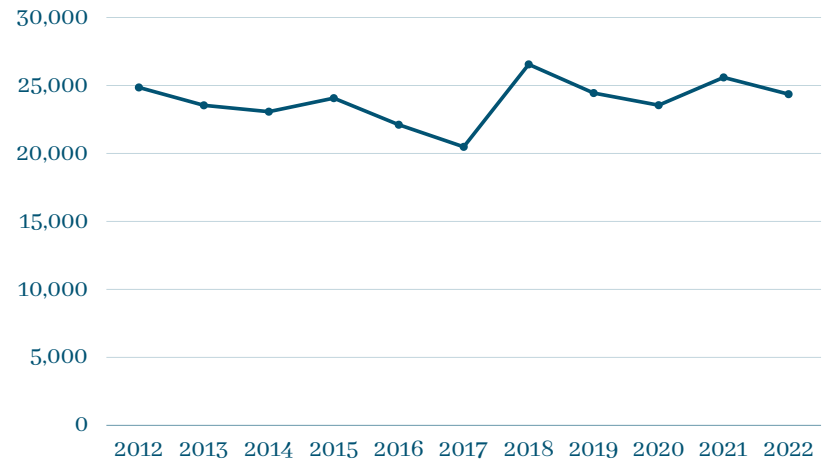

Donations Included

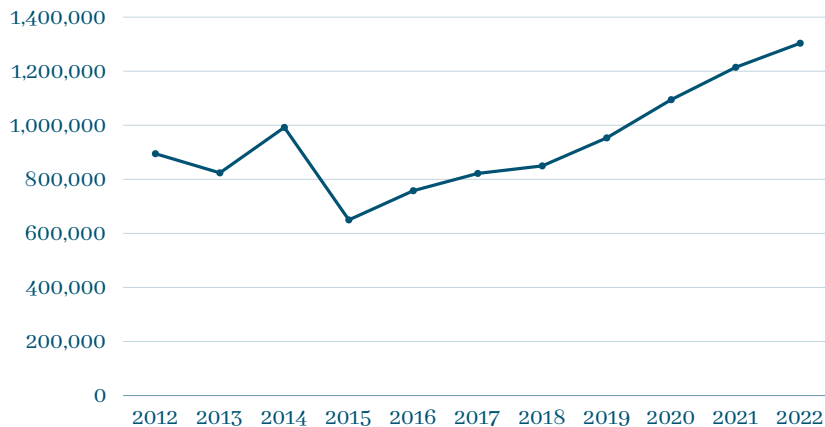


Average Grant Amount

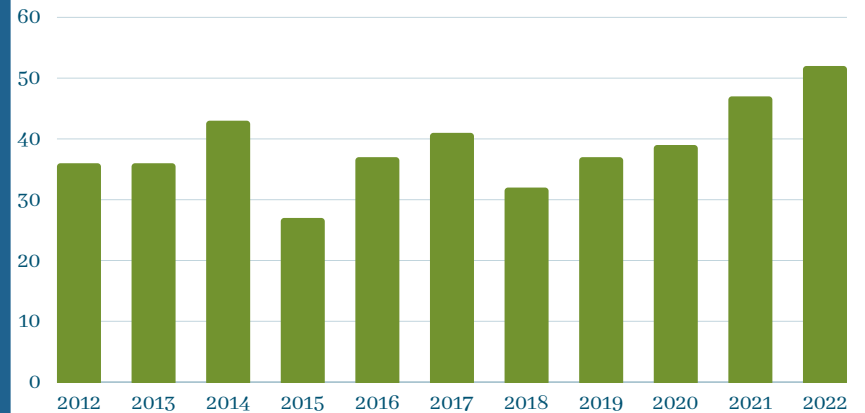


Total Granted by Year

BLIND & VISUALLY IMPAIRED

AMERICAN COUNCIL OF THE BLIND

ALEXANDRIA, VA \$30,000

Funding to support, maintain and expand the ACB Media Network platform for distribution and hosting community events.

AMERICAN PRINTING HOUSE FOR THE BLIND, INC.

LOUISVILLE, KY \$37,625

Support the APH Connect Center Transition Hub which will gather and share information about the many transition programs offered throughout the United States within one online location.

BLIND CHILDREN'S CENTER, INC.

LOS ANGELES, CA \$35,000

Contribute funds to support the BCC's Disability Services and help achieve funding requirements in order to keep their qualification from the Los Angeles Board of Education.

BLIND INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

THORNTON, CO \$40,000

Funding to increase the number of students that obtain Salesforce certification and enter the BIT Apprenticeship program.

CAMP ABILITIES - DELAWARE

WILMINGTON, DE \$5,000

Funding to help implement Camp Abilities - DE's first overnight, week-long camp experience for campers with visual impairments, while also providing an opportunity for more kids to participate.

CITY ACCESS NEW YORK

STATEN ISLAND, NY \$25,000

Assist The Career Discovery Project's year-round career development program that connects blind and visually impaired high school and college students with relevant work experiences related to their career goals or college majors.

COMPUTERS FOR THE BLIND

RICHARDSON, TX \$23,840

Support the "Compute With Confidence" training program that will allow device users to learn the basic skills of computer access.

CONKLIN DAVIS CENTER FOR THE VISUALLY IMPAIRED

DAYTONA BEACH, FL \$30,000

Assist with funding for The Conklin Davis Creative Arts Program to provide instruction designed to foster the creativity of individuals who are blind or visually impaired. The Creative Arts Program will also offer workshops and gallery events for other artists in the community, in support of CDCVI.

Support The College Success Program to create sustainable, positive changes in communities and mitigate barriers to college success while enabling broader access to services individuals with vision loss need, to achieve independence.

PHOENIX, AZ \$25,000

Support for two staff members who create and oversee the opportunities for 100 students who move through transition service programs.

FUTURE IN SIGHT

CONCORD, NH \$50,000

Provide funding for a Electronic Medical Record (EMR) pilot program which will reduce the amount of complex work, vastly simplify the process and encourage and increase referrals from eye doctors to Future in Sight.

IDAHO EDUCATIONAL SERVICES FOR THE DEAF AND BLIND FOUNDATION

Funding for their Summer Enrichment Camp that will provide opportunities for deaf blind children to experience summer camp activities that most children have the opportunity to experience. Expanded Core Curriculum will be used and reinforced throughout the four day camp.

Continued support for the Early Intervention Services program that started with through a TGFF mini grant, and is now entering its second year of services. Services are provided in the home, pre-school and other appropriate environments.

LOWELL, MA \$35,000

Funding to hire a part time Client Assistance Program Coordinator that will actively reach out to new and former LAB clients and provide information on LAB and community services that they may need.

NATIONAL BRAILLE PRESS

BOSTON, MA \$50,000

Assistance for a new program, in which free resource kits filled with braille and tactile educational materials will be distributed to teaching professionals in the blindness field.

NEWVIEW OKLAHOMA

OKLAHOMA CITY, OK \$48,500

Provide scholarships for 10 visually impaired individuals to participate in the MOVE Vocational Training, which provides immersive and comprehensive training for individuals with vision loss, helping them develop relevant and marketable employment skills.

NORTHWEST ASSOCIATION FOR BLIND ATHLETES

VANCOUVER, WA \$42,500

Funds to assist a new Program Manager in a Boise office who will be responsible for the expansion of programs and services in Idaho for individuals who are blind.

Provide funding to add a full-time position to oversee the virtual programming which will bring stability and continuity to what has become a critical and growing offering at their organization.

Enable the Children's Braille 4 Beginners program is to get more braille books into the hands of pre braille readers so they can begin to learn pre braille reading concepts.

THE CARROLL CENTER FOR THE BLIND

NEWTON, MA

\$40,000

Funds to help launch an innovative, new User Testing Training program which will instill individuals with the technical skills needed for positions in the IT industry as user testing evaluators.

THE PERKINS SCHOOL FOR THE BLIND

WATERTOWN, MA

\$50,000

Funding to help Career Launch, an innovative job training and career services program that empowers participants to overcome individual challenges when seeking employment.

THE RESEARCH FOUNDATION FOR SUNY, THE COLLEGE AT BROCKPORT

BROCKPORT, NY

\$10,462

Support for a 24-hour goalball marathon with Paralympic athletes which will include mentoring, interacting with the campers and lessons on self-advocating.

Provide "Campership" support for local children with diabetes to attend a diabetic specific camp, as well as provide funding for new technology to monitor glucose readings of overnight campers.

Assist Camp Summit in launching a Seasonal Staff Recruitment & Retention Project to retain the adequate number of quality staff in order to successfully run a quality camp program.

EYE TO EYE, INC.

Enable Eye to Eye to provide Near-Peer Mentoring to Colorado students with learning disabilities.

Support Gifts of Love's Retail Rescue food acquisition and distribution program to collect surplus food inventories from local grocery and retail establishments to be distributed through food pantries and off-site locations.

KIDS MAKING IT, INC.

Funds for furnishings and other items to improve the functionality and appearance of our upstairs classroom space to create a safe, inviting and comfortable space that can meet the needs of our life skills and Skilled Trades programs while serving as a "home away from home" for the students we serve.

Enable Kids on the Move acquire specialized pieces of equipment to be lent out to families to help their child with special needs strengthen their core muscle groups and support ongoing physical therapy.

MINDING YOUR MIND

ARDMORE, PA \$20,000

Empower Minding Your Mind to fulfill the needs of schools and community groups for mental health education and suicide prevention programming for Maine and Rhode Island.

RALSTON HOUSE

ARVADA, CO \$5,000

Provide funding to Ralston House that will support a portion of salaries of forensic interviewers and victim advocates who provide essential services to child victims.

RISING STARS THERAPEUTIC RIDING CENTER, INC.

TWIN FALLS, ID \$8,000

Contribute to supplemental program support in response to rapid inflation and severe economic times, helping them continue the expanded services they had just begun.

FAMILIES, ADULTS, AND CHILDREN

SMART LIVING, LEARNING & EARNING WITH AUTISM

EUGENE, OR \$21,616

Empower the SOS (Supporting, Obtaining and Sustaining) program to focus on employment for people with disabilities. This program builds on a previously funded project by TGFF, HIRE-ME, and will focus on enhancing the abilities of people with disabilities to navigate work related interactions and make decisions effectively on the job.

STEPS TO END DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

BURLINGTON, VT \$30,863

Assist the expansion of the children's programming to two full-time Youth Advocates who are trained and able to provide trauma-informed, culturally considerate, comprehensive and responsive children's services for survivors both living in our shelter and in the community.

THE CHILDREN'S CENTER

VANCOUVER, WA \$25,000

Support the treatment to child victims of sexual abuse and non-offending family members to lessen the effects of the emotional and psychological trauma.

THE CHILDREN'S HOME SOCIETY OF IDAHO

BOISE, ID \$35,000

Funding for one clinician's salary for the period of two years to support the crisis management plan to service the recent changes in mental health services.

THE GARDEN FOUNDATION

LAS VEGAS, NV \$5,000

Support costs associated with hiring professional contractors to present specialized classes to their different ability GROW clients from May 2022 through Dec 2022.

THE REFUGE - UTAH

OREM, UT \$19,397

Enable The Refuge to replace two 28-year-old security gates that provide secure access to our domestic violence shelter and transitional housing campus facilities.

THE ROAD HOME

SALT LAKE CITY, UT \$30,000

Assistance towards their Housing-Focused Case Management Program to implement The Road Home Housing Program.

VETERANS COMMUNITY PROJECT

KANSAS CITY, MO \$5,000

Support towards The Emergency Assistance Fund program to help reduce greater risk and provide time for veterans to continue to work toward more long-term solutions to housing. This includes a variety of creative solutions to get Veterans housed affordably and ensure the income necessary to maintain stable housing.

Empower Wayside Community Meals to provide a community meals program where, in addition to nutritious food, parents develop a social support network, essential for vulnerable families to advance their quality of life.

PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

ABILITY 1ST UTAH

PROVO, UT \$6,000

Provide funding for construction documents for the installation of an elevator with additional ADA improvements, helping their newly purchased building be more accessible to their clients.

C.A.S.T. FOR KIDS

SALEM, OR \$25,000

Assist C.A.S.T. for Kids to create a Strategic Information/Promotional Marketing Plan to be more effective in sharing their mission. This will be done by updating their website, PSA promotions and professional promotional materials for their volunteer coordinators and instructional videos.

FRIENDS IN ACTION

DURHAM, NH \$9,951

Funding to create a Community Engagement Center where participants, UNH students and community members can socialize, play games, have lunch together, enjoy mentors, participate in specialized programs such as sewing, robotics and art classes and enjoy one another's company.

HISTORIC ELSINORE THEATER

SALEM, OR \$5,000

Support the Elsinore Theater, "Monthly Movie Fun at the Elsinore" by removing financial barriers that specifically target adults experiencing developmental and intellectual disability by offering a free movie on the first Tuesday of each month.

NATIONAL ABILITY CENTER

PARK CITY, UT \$20,000

Assist NAC with the COACH internship program that funds adaptive recreation and training for youth and young adults with disabilities who are seeking to develop key life skills leading to community engagement & employment opportunities.

OUTDOORS FOR ALL

SEATTLE, WA \$32,000

Empower Outdoors For All to purchase needed equipment, support financial aid for participants, and underwrite costs of program operations. At least 53% of Foundation funds will be used to support participants with visual impairment.

WAYPOINT ADVENTURES, INC.

LEXINGTON, MA \$25,000

Enable Waypoint Adventure to re-launched their Leaders in Training (LIT) program and empower young adults with disabilities to focus specifically on solving exclusion in the disability community through adventure-learning and leadership development.

NEXT GEN PARTNERS WITH ENVISION

Through the leadership of Chairman, Jackson Beazer, the Next Gen worked collectively to build a relationship and support a grant with Envision in Dallas, Texas. Between phone conversations and zoom calls with Envision's staff and the Next Gen members, it was realized that providing support towards their *College Success Program* was where the Next Gen felt they could make the greatest impact.

Envision's *College Success Program* was developed to support students who are blind or have low vision to get the resources they need to make the most of their college experience and achieve their goals. The program offers a support system that utilizes and shares the knowledge of experts in the blindness field. Some of these experts are recent college graduates who are blind themselves, who help guide students via mentorship as they transition from high school to college and employment.

Envision shared that they were adding 500 new students to their program, but the number of mentors they currently had would not be able to support the increase in students. The Next Gen unanimously decided that providing funds to increase the number of mentors was incredibly important for the program. Through the relationship built with Envision's staff and the work of the Next Gen, a \$60,000 grant was given to the *College Success Program* to support bringing on 20 more mentors!
